

Alex Pheby's *Playthings* is a visceral and darkly comic portrait of severe mental illness based on the true story of nineteenth-century German judge and patient of Freud, Daniel Paul Schreber. While deftly exploring the ideas of madness and sanity, of reality and delusion, Pheby reflects Schreber's disordered mind in vertiginous prose, and compassionately reveals the humanity and tragedy of his psychosis.

Alex Pheby was born in Essex and moved to Worcester in his early childhood. He currently lives in London, where he teaches at the University of Greenwich. His first novel, *Grace*, was published in 2009 by Two Ravens Press. His second novel, *Playthings*—about the life of the Daniel Paul Schreber—was published in 2015 in the UK by Galley Beggar Press. Widely acclaimed in media from the *Guardian* to the *New York Times*, and called "the best neuronovel ever written" in the *Literary Review*, *Playthings* was shortlisted for the 2016 £30,000 Wellcome Book Prize.



Both *The Lighthouse* and her second novel, *He Wants* (Biblioasis, 2016), were Observer Books of the Year. Her most recent novel is *Death and the Seaside* (forthcoming from Biblioasis). Her short fiction has been included in *Best British Short Stories* and *Best British Horror* anthologies and broadcast on BBC Radio. The title story of her debut collection, *The Pre-War House and Other Stories*, won a novella prize. Her first children's book, *Sunny and the Ghosts*, will be published in the UK in 2018.







Inspired by the legendary jazz pianist Oscar Peterson, and imbued with magical realism, Mauricio Segura evokes the atmosphere of the cabarets of 1950s in this swinging novel. Mauricio Segura was born in Temuco, Chile in 1969 and immigrated to Quebec with his parents as a child. He studied economics at the Université de Montréal and French literature at McGill University. With a doctoral degree in French language and literature, he has taught at McGill and Concordia universities. Segura lives in Montreal where he is a well-known journalist, screenwriter, and commentator on immigrant issues. His novels, *Black Alley, Eucalyptus,* and *Oscar* have been translated into English by Biblioasis.
